When a character in a book or movie is going through "The Coming of Age," it means they are growing up, learning new things, and becoming the person they are meant to be.



HOW TO WRITE A CREATIVE WRITING ESSAY:

Brainstorm your idea's. (TIP: Use a mind map diagram to help you)



- An introduction to your story needs to be captivating and grab the attention of yourreader.
- The introduction needs to introduce the theme or the main idea behind your essay.
- You need to establish the mood or the atmosphere you imagined for your essay.

Step 4:

Start writing your **Body**:

- In the body of your essay, you will need to introduce and describe your characters ina way that makes them interesting and relatable.
- Describe the time and place where your story begins, create a clear picture for thereader.
- This is a creative writing essay so you will need to write about a conflict or challengethat your characters will face and show how they resolve it.
- Use descriptive language so that the judges can get a clear picture of what you'retrying to portray in your story.
- Include dialog between your characters, this will help the judges understand yourcharacters better.
- Instead of simply stating facts, use scenes and actions to convey emotions andevents.

Step 5:

Start writing your Conclusion

- Your conclusion is where you start to wrap up the story. Here you will resolve the main conflictor challenge you introduced in the body of your essay to bring your story to an end.
- End with a strong and memorable closing line that will stay in the reader's mind.

Creativity is key in a creative writing essay. Don't be afraid to experiment with different writingstyles, perspectives, and storytelling techniques to make your essay unique and engaging.
